
could be held in June? Anyone who will be attending, please let me know.

CONSTITUTION AND BYLAWS

ARTICLE I

NAME AND PURPOSE

Section One: Title

This organization shall be known as the <u>GAY AND LESBIAN HISTORY ON STAMPS CLUB (GLHSC)</u>. It shall be operated exclusively for non-profit purposes. It is an official study unit of the American Topical Association (ATA), membership number 458. It is also affiliated with the American Philatelic Society (APS), affiliate number 205, and the American First Day Cover Society (AFDCS), number 72. Any member(s) in good standing wishing to commence a chapter utilizing or referencing the name of this organization may do so by filing a written request to the Board.

Section Two: Objectives

The objectives of GLHSC are to promote and foster an interest in the collection, study and dissemination of knowledge of worldwide philatelic material depicting:

- notable men and women (and their contributions to society) for whom historical evidence exists of homosexual or bisexual behavior, orientation or support,
- mythology, historical events and ideas (such as laws) significant in the history of gay culture,
- flora and fauna scientifically proven as having prominent homosexual behavior,
- maintain and provide facilities for archives pertaining to this facet of philately for the benefit of present and new philatelists in their endeavors,
- and to promote philately in general to the public.

ARTICLE II

MEMBERSHIP

Section One: Qualifications

Any individual or organization interested in this facet of topical collecting and willing to agree and conform to the Constitution and Bylaws of said organization is cligible for membership.

Section Two: Application

Anyone desiring membership in this organization shall be required to submit a complete application form to the Secretary or designee, together with the sum required for dues.

All records are kept under strict confidentiality. GLHSC does not disclose any of its membership data for the purpose of advertising or to other GLHSC members. Anyone wishing to contact any club members are asked to submit a SASE to the secretary, and in return, it will be forwarded to that party.

GLHSC O SPRING 1995

Section Three: Membership Classification

Membership of GLHSC shall be unlimited as to numbers and shall include the following classifications:

- Active Member (A): Anyone allowing their name and address to be submitted
 to the ATA, APS or AFDCS; has all rights and responsibilities of GLHSC; can
 run for any office of GLHSC. In order for GLHSC to maintain its affiliation
 with ATA, APS and AFDCS, the officers and a minimum number of members
 must be affiliated with each group.
- Supportive Member (S): Anyone wishing to have their name and address excluded from the ATA, APS or AFDCS list; cannot run or vote for any office; has all other rights and responsibilities of GLHSC.
- 3) Complementary Member (C): Any organization or individual wishing to obtain a copy of the journal for the sole purpose of archival value and/or review; has no rights or responsibilities under the bylaws; exempt from paying dues.

Section Four: Membership Fee Schedule

Members are expected to pay their dues yearly by the first of the quarter as listed in the first three digits on their mailing label. Dues not paid within 30 days of the due date is cause for deletion from the GLHSC mailing list

1** - dues are due by January 1

2** - dues are due by April 1

3** - dues are due by July 1

4** - dues are due by October 1

The purpose of the dues is to pay for the production and distribution of the quarterly journal.

ARTICLE III

OFFICERS

Section One: Executive Officers

The executive officers of GLHSC shall consist of the Board of Directors. They will perform the duties prescribed by these bylaws. They shall not receive compensation for services rendered, except for reimbursement of administrative expenses. The term of office for all officers shall be for three calendar years. There will be no limits to the number of terms.

Section Two: Board of Directors

The Board of Directors (Board) shall consist of the President, Vice President, Secretary, Editor and Treasurer. They shall be responsible for the general supervision and management of GLHSC and its activities.

Section Three: President

The President will have general supervisory power over all matters of GLHSC; will preside at all meetings unless he/she is unable to attend; shall be an ex-officio member of all committees; will represent GLHSC in a professional manner to other philatelic and other organizations; shall coordinate publicity and membership drives; shall perform other duties as the Board may direct from time to time.

Section Four: Vice President

The Vice President will be expected to assume the duties of the President in his or her absence or if the position of President becomes vacant; shall perform other duties as the Board may direct from time to time.

Section Five: Secretary

The Secretary shall be the custodian of all records and properties belonging to GLHSC; shall attend all meetings; responsible for keeping accurate and permanent records of all meetings; shall perform other duties as the Board may direct from time to time.

Section Six: Treasurer

The Treasurer shall maintain the financial records of GLHSC; shall pay all bills on the behalf of GLHSC; shall report to the Secretary all delinquent accounts; shall present a yearly financial report to the Board.

Section Seven: Editor

The Editor shall be responsible for the publication of the Lambda Philatelic Journal; shall be responsible for the editing and selecting of material submitted to GLHSC.

ARTICLE IV

ELECTIONS

All active members of GLHSC are eligible to hold and vote for any office. Elections shall be by mail ballot with a simple majority of ballots cast necessary for election to any office. Nominations shall be received by the President two months prior to the elections

ARTICLE V

MEETINGS

An annual meeting shall be held, if possible, at a time and place as determined by the President. The meeting shall be held in conjunction with the ATA annual convention or the APS annual Stampshow or with other philatelic meetings whenever possible. General meetings may be held at any time and place when deemed necessary by the President upon thirty days notice to the membership.

ARTICLE VI

PUBLICATION

The publication of GLHSC is the Lambda Philatelic Journal. It is to be published quarterly by the Editor. Any member can submit articles of interest to the Editor for publication. It is the Editor's right to edit, publish or refuse any article submitted.

GAY AND LESBIAN UPDATE

February 10, 1994 was the first day of issue for the Brazilian stamp honoring Menininha do Gantios. She was a black priestess of Brazilian voodoo. She was also a lesbian, though closeted. See the book, O Lesbianisms no Brasil, 1988 by Dr. Luis Mott.



The US Postal Service is at it again. This time, they issued a new Love stamp. It features two cherubs resting their chins on a coffin top. The artist was Raphael, who was gay. It now turns out that the coffin top upon which they rest is that of Pope Julius II, who was also gay!

Greg Louganis has hit the newstand in a wild way. He is currently on several magazine covers and has released his autobiography. He also appears on the stamps from six different stamp issuing entities:

St. Vincent-Grenadines ?

In Vladmir Horowitz's recent book, it is revealed that he preferred men (page 131). It also reveals that his wife knew of such, but was still deeply in love with him (page 136). Her father, Arturo Toscanini, was honored on a US stamp in 1989, Scott No. 2411.

The Israeli Postal Authority issued a stamp to honor Leonard Bernstein on February 7, 1995. The 4.10-shekel stamp depicts Bernstein conducting music from his Symphony No. 1 - Jeremiah and a picture of the Jewish prophet Jeremiah. Bernstein was outed in 1990 after his death.


AIDS UPDATE

Algeria has issued an AIDS stamp in conjunction with the UN World AIDS Day on December 1.

Monaco issued a "Fight against AIDS" stamp on October 7, 1994. The AIDS stamp is the high value (8fr) of Monaco's 1994 Red Cross issue. The low value (6fr) is for the fight against cancer.

Belgium has included a "Fight against AIDS" stamp in their 1995 stamp program. It should be issued on November 6, 1995. It is scheduled to be issued as a semi-postal. Semi-postals are issued by many countries. The "extra" paid for the stamp is donated to certain organizations. The United States does not issue semi-postals.

Copies of the Peru AIDS stamp (imperforate) with a doubling effect have been found. It appears that two of the colors are misregistered by about 1 mm which creates the doubling effect. They were presented as being double printed.

Phil Stager has prepared a slide presentation on AIDS and philately. It will be shown at the American Association for the History of Medicine in May in Pittsburgh.

TOPEX-NEVPEX '95 will be held in Reno, Nevada. It has been rescheduled to July 7-9, 1995. It will be held in the South Meeting Room complex of the Reno/Sparks Convention Center located at 4950 South Virginia Street, Reno, Nevada.

The APS STAMPSHOW will be held in St. Louis, Missouri on August 24-27, 1995. It will be held at the Cervantes Convention Center.

While reading the recent Linn's Stamp News (March 20, 1995, page 45), I noticed an item in the recent trends section.

"The first-day ceremony held in Washington, D.C., for United States Scott 2032-35, the 20 cent Balloons stamps issued March 31, 1983, included a brief ascent in a castle-shaped hot air balloon by then-Postmaster General William F. Bolger. He was accompanied by the owner of the craft, magazine publisher and internationally-known balloonist Malcolm Forbes."

Malcolm Forbes was outed shortly after his death several years ago.



Alexander von Humboldt and Aimé Bonpland explored South America together. Published correspondence revealed an intimacy between the two explorers.




Justus von Liebig "We found, understood, loved and will forever love each other" (Platen's diary)
